DIRECTOR DIMARCO ANNOUNCES SPENDING FREEZE

At the August 3, 2022, Commissioner meeting, Frank J. DiMarco, Director of the Board of Gloucester County Commissioners, urged his commissioner colleagues to adopt a resolution that would freeze spending for the next three years. Director DiMarco stated, "I know we cannot control inflation and gas prices at the county level but taking this step will help our tax-paying residents get through this bumpy period."

Director DiMarco authorized the County Administrator and his team to take the necessary

measures to accomplish this spending freeze while protecting services for seniors, veterans, emergency responders, and special needs residents.

Director DiMarco continued, "One of our primary goals has been to lead this county with fiscal responsibility. Since 2007 our administration has looked to cut costs, merge departments, and share services at a rate no other can match in New Jersey. Under this approach, we have attritioned over 463 positions, saving more than \$31.9 million in salary and benefit

expenses from the county budget. Even more significant was this board's decision to close the county jail system and regionalize it with other county jails in 2013. This decision has brought over \$223 million savings in nine years, without laying off one employee."

"I am proud we could CUT the county tax rate two years in a row but felt we need to do more. And because we have taken those steps, we are in a position where we can do that for our residents," commented DiMarco.

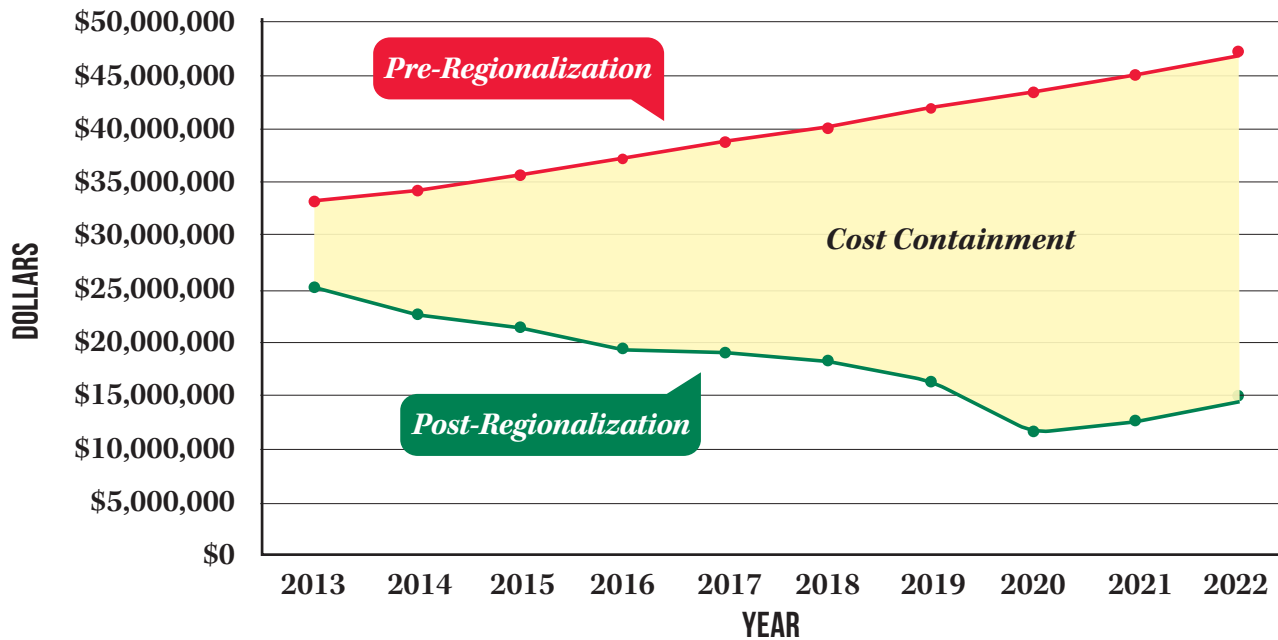

COMMISSIONER DICARLO SUCCESSFULLY LOBBIES FOR EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AND GLOUCESTER COUNTY FIRE ACADEMY FUNDING

The State of New Jersey recently passed its Fiscal Year 2022/2023 budget. Included in this was Gloucester County's request to expand emergency operations infrastructure to better equip our emergency responders.

Through active dialogue with Senator Fred Madden, he was able to secure a funding commitment through the new Senate President Nicholas Scutari.

Commission Director Frank J. DiMarco said, "Thanks to the tireless efforts of Senator Fred Madden and Commissioner Denice DiCarlo, our First Responders will have better training opportunities and facilities better equipped to handle emergency situations."

These funds will expand our 911 center's operations, address our relocation of an EMS building in Harrison Township, and renovate and expand our Fire Training Academy with much-needed training props and apparatus.

"Relationships matter," stated Commissioner Denice DiCarlo. "When I approached Fred Madden, he did not hesitate to lend his expertise and assistance to help Gloucester County and our First Responders."

Commissioner DiCarlo looks forward to working on these infrastructure projects immediately.

HONOR THOSE LOST TO SUBSTANCE ABUSE

The Gloucester County Board of Commissioners and the Gloucester County Addictions Task Force will hold its annual Candlelight Vigil in remembrance of overdose victims on August 30th at James G. Atkinson Park.

The vigil is held to raise awareness of opioid overdose and reduce the stigma of drug-related death. The vigil will begin at dusk, while resource tables will open at 7 p.m.

In the event of a public health emergency, volunteers are our most valuable resource.

The mission of the Gloucester County Medical Reserve Corp (GCMRC) is to improve the health and safety of communities by organizing and utilizing public health, medical, and other volunteers. The GCMRC's goal is to enhance the community's emergency preparedness by ensuring that a trained group of healthcare professionals and community volunteers are ready to respond to public health emergencies. Licensed/certified healthcare professionals, practicing/retired, living/working in Gloucester County are needed. Any community members interested in health issues can volunteer (interpreters, chaplains, social workers, etc.). Duties might include direct patient care, administrative/secretarial duties, and translation/reception duties.

Volunteers are required to participate in training and education in order to be adequately prepared should an event occur. They must perform duties in accord to their interests, training, and experience. We provide FREE TRAINING to our volunteers to ensure support for our local health agencies for any public emergency when called upon.

GLOUCESTER COUNTY'S SMALL BUSINESS RECOVERY GRANT SUPPORTS OUR LOCAL BUSINESSES

Director Frank J. DiMarco and Deputy Director Heather Simmons, liaison to the Department of Economic Development, remind small businesses that the **Small Business Recovery Grant** can assist with economic hardships experienced by small businesses due to the pandemic.

Director DiMarco and Deputy Director Simmons say that more than \$1.2 million has been set aside to help local businesses with \$10,000 grants.

All grant applications must meet the CDBG National Objective of Low/Mod Income for the benefitting business. The business must document that it will retain at least one permanent job held by a low- and moderate-income person and that the jobs would be lost without the CDBG assistance. Applicants must be able to prove the funds were used for the approved use.

To apply for the program, the business must be a for-profit enterprise located in Gloucester County and established as of Dec. 31, 2020. In addition, a business cannot be delinquent on any taxes and must provide financial documentation, including information on loss of revenue due to COVID-19.

Submissions that have all required documentation will receive awards up to \$10,000 for each eligible applicant until the funds are exhausted.
