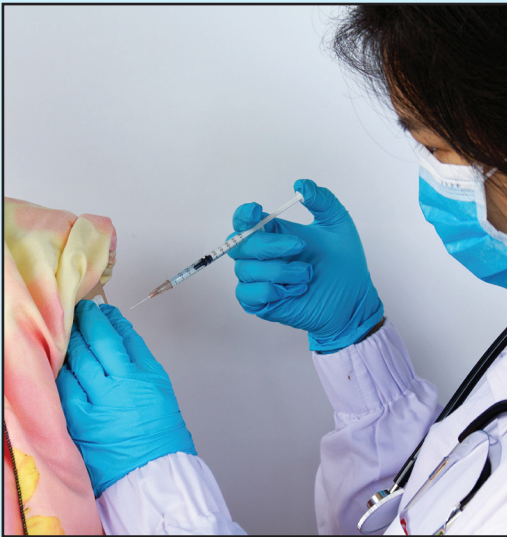

NUTRITION PROGRAM FOR SENIORS

The Nutrition Program provides a well-balanced mid-day meal Monday through Friday to seniors who are 60 or older or the spouse of a participant. Meals are planned by a nutritionist to ensure that diners receive the recommended nutrients. Sites are at Mantua Township Community Center, Glassboro Township Senior Center, Thorofare Fire Hall, Monroe Township Pfeiffer Community Center, Deptford Township First Baptist Church of Jericho, and Paulsboro Township Second Baptist Church. A donation of \$1.25 is accepted for each meal, however, there is no obligation to contribute. Nutrition Sites will be closed on December 24-25.

Serv-a-Tray is our home-delivered meal program designed to maintain health through proper nutrition and enable homebound seniors to remain in the community with independence and dignity. To be eligible, persons must be age 60 or older; homebound; unable to shop or prepare their own meals; have no one to assist with meals; and be on a regular diet.

THE GLOUCESTER COUNTY ANIMAL SHELTER SEEKS ADOPTERS!

The Gloucester County Animal Shelter is at full capacity and in urgent need of residents to adopt and provide homes to the dogs and cats currently in its care.

The Animal Shelter functions as an impoundment and adoption facility for the public. The shelter staffs 36 employees who provide services in two ways: Animal Control services and Animal Shelter services.

"Our Animal Shelter serves over 3,000 domestic animals each year and, as we head into the winter months and holiday season, is currently full. We ask that compassionate County residents with the ability to give these pets a safe and happy home consider adoption," said Director Frank J. DiMarco, liaison to the Gloucester County Animal Shelter.

Not only do animals give you unconditional love, but they are psychologically, emotionally, and physically beneficial to their companions. Caring for a pet can provide a sense of purpose and fulfillment and lessen feelings of loneliness. And when you adopt, you can also feel proud about helping an animal in need!

While we are encouraging people to come and adopt these animals, it is also important that you prepare yourself for the responsibilities that come with adoption. These beautiful animals deserve to find a happy and safe home so that they can live life to the fullest. GEARING UP FOR SNOW



The Department of Public Works is getting ready for snow and ice season! Deputy Director Heather Simmons noted, "County trucks will be brining emergency routes, overpasses, and major county roadways throughout the winter season during any storms that may impact the Gloucester County region."

The county's trucks will be prepared and loaded with salt. We have 7,000 tons of salt on hand throughout the county and 10,000 gallons of brine. The Public Works Department generally will not plow roads until there is upward of two inches of snow on the ground. They may spread salt on overpasses and icy areas and, when necessary, push slush off the roadways.

Deputy Director Simmons added, "We always are working to keep our roadways safe, and we ask that motorists minimize travel whenever possible during icy and snowing conditions."
