RCSJ HEALTH SCIENCE CENTER RIBBON-CUTTING HELD

On Monday, May 1, Inspira Health, Rowan College of South Jersey (RCSJ), Rowan University, and the Gloucester County Board of Commissioners cut the ribbon on the new Inspira Health Sciences Center on the RCSJ-Gloucester Campus.

The result of a partnership between RCSJ, Inspira, and the Gloucester County Board of Commissioners, the new Health Sciences Center will host the first Respiratory Therapy training program in New Jersey, along with the Exercise Science program and two additional programs that are under development. Classes at the new building will be held beginning in September.

"This is a special day, especially in this time of a critical shortage of allied health professionals," said Commissioner Director Frank J. DiMarco as he addressed the more than 150 in attendance. "We are very proud of this collaboration," he added. "RCSJ is one of the top-ranked nursing programs in the nation, and this is a premier Eds and Meds campus."

"We serve the people here in Gloucester County," RCSJ President Dr. Frederick Keating pointed out. "My focus is connecting education with industry. Over the past several years, I've talked with industry leaders asking, 'What credentials does your current workforce need? Who will you need to hire, and with what skills, for future growth?'"



Former State Senate President Stephen Sweeney remarked that, "This is an amazing day. Years ago, the nursing program was decertified. Now it is one of the best in the Northeast. The County is trying to create a workforce for tomorrow and a pathway for careers."

"We partnered together to create the economic development that needs to happen," noted Inspira Health President/CEO Amy Mansue. "There are 193 individuals from Inspira now enrolled at RCSJ. They receive tuition reduction from our partnership with the college and tuition reimbursement from us. The Inspira staff can go to school for free."

COMMISSIONERS MOURN THE DEATH OF OFFICER SHISLER

Director Frank J. DiMarco and the entire Board of County Commissioners were greatly saddened to learn of the loss of Deptford Police Officer Robert Shisler, who was shot in the line-of-duty on March 10 and succumbed to his injuries on May 7.



"We extend our deepest condolences to his family, friends, and fellow officers during this difficult time. Rest assured his sacrifice will always be remembered, and his memory will live on through the valor and commitment of all law enforcement officers," noted Director DiMarco.

ENVIRONMENTAL UNIT GEARS UP TO KEEP RESIDENTS SAFE THIS SUMMER

The work of the Environmental Unit of the Gloucester County Health Department occurs largely behind the scenes but is critical to keeping residents safe. As summer approaches, the Unit's staff has been quite busy.

The Environmental Unit enforces the New Jersey Department of Health's Public Recreation Bathing Code by performing inspections of public pools. This helps prevent recreational water illnesses and injuries. The Unit's staff also works closely with facility pool managers to ensure adequate maintenance standards are in place.

Summer also means festivals and festivals mean food trucks! The Environmental Unit works to assure that food truck owners and operators adhere to the rules and regulations for the safe preparation of food, helping ensure that residents and visitors have a safe and



pleasant experience when purchasing from these vendors.

HOUSING REHABILITATION ASSISTANCE AVAILABLE TO HOMEOWNERS



The County offers a program to help low- and moderate- income homeowners renovate their homes through a 0% interest deferred payment loan program, Deputy Director Heather Simmons, liaison to the Department of Economic Development, reminds residents. The purpose of the program is to bring owner-occupied dwellings up to local and state building codes, provide a more livable and suitable environment for homeowners, increase property values, and serve as a catalyst for neighborhood revitalization.

TICK SAFETY TIPS

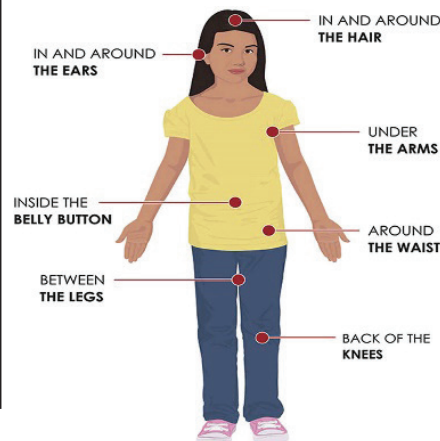
During warm weather months, ticks are more likely to feed on humans. Ticks can carry various diseases, with Lyme disease being most common.

Here are some tips to keep you and your family safe:

- Ticks prefer dark, damp areas such as long grass and brush and are often carried by pets.
- Apply an EPA-registered insect repellent, ideally with at least 20% DEET.
- Perform a tick check after being outdoors. See the illustration, which notes where ticks are most commonly found.
- If you do find a tick, remove it by the head of the tick with fine-point tweezers. Wash the skin with rubbing alcohol or soap and water and save the tick

in rubbing alcohol in a sealed plastic bag in case you need to show a doctor.

• Be on the lookout for signs that may appear, such as a rash or flu-like symptoms, and contact your health care provider.



FREE CPR CLASSES AVAILABLE FROM GCEMS



Commissioner Denice DiCarlo, liaison to the Gloucester County Emergency Medical Service (GCEMS), reminds residents that sudden cardiac arrest is the leading cause of death in adults. Immediately performing CPR and calling 9-1-1 after someone experiences a heart attack doubles, or even triples, the possibility of the person surviving. GCEMS offers low cost, potentially lifesaving CPR training monthly to members of the public, youth coaches, church groups, employers, service organizations, and anyone interested. ENERGY ASSISTANCE APPLICATION DEADLINE IS JUNE 30

The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) helps low- and moderate-income households with heating bills and medically necessary cooling costs, emergency heating system services, and emergency fuel assistance. Applications for the 2022-2023 season will close on **Friday, June 30**. Due to increases in federal income limits, higher-income families may now apply for assistance and are encouraged to do so. Past-due energy, water, and/or sewer bills can also be submitted for assistance. Households must pay for home energy and heating costs directly or through their rent, and have gross income at or below 60% of the state median income to be eligible for LIHEAP assistance. Residents of public housing or receiving rental assistance are not eligible unless they pay the fuel supplier directly for their energy and

heating costs. LIHEAP benefits are determined by income, household size, fuel type, and heating region.

Those who are over the age of 60 or disabled that qualify for assistance can also contact the Gloucester County Division of Senior Services at (856) 384-6900 or email seniors@co.gloucester.nj.us. Please note that applications submitted are reviewed on a rolling basis and assistance is awarded on a first-come, first-served basis, so applicants are advised to apply as soon as possible.

PUBLIC WORKS & ENGINEERING HARD AT WORK

Deputy Director Heather Simmons, liaison to the Department of Public Works, reminds residents that in addition to attending to the County's daily maintenance and infrastructure needs and responding to emergencies, the Department of Public Works carries out projects throughout the County on an ongoing basis.

Listed below are a few projects that were recently completed or are underway:

- Removal of old concrete walking paths and installation of new asphalt walking paths at Greenwich Lake
- Paving a small parking lot for the Prosecutor's Office behind the Shady Lane offices
- Construction of a new parking lot at Pitman Golf Course
- Installation of new drainage inlets to help with drainage in several locations, including Clayton and 32nd Avenues in Elk



The Office of the County Engineer also designs and executes major infrastructure projects. Currently ongoing projects include:

- Construction of a new road to connect Woodbury Glassboro Road with the Rowan University Fossil Park site
- Improvement of the intersection of US 322/CR 655 Fries Mill Road with a new signal, installation of right and left hand turn lanes, new storm water system and repaving the intersection
- Resurfacing of CR 623 Clems Run Road between CR 619 Whig Lane and US 322 in Elk and Harrison Townships
- Resurfacing of CR 553 Woodbury Glassboro Road between Pitman Avenue and Lambs Road in Pitman and Mantua
- Resurfacing and safety improvements to CR 644 Red Bank Avenue from SR 44 Crown Point Road to Mehorter Boulevard in the Township of West Deptford and City of Woodbury
- County-wide drainage and storm water improvement project involving the placement of pipe lining to repair damaged storm sewer pipe in lieu of removal and replacement of storm pipe
- County-wide drainage and storm water management project involving pipe replacement, bridge rehabilitation, and drainage structure reconstruction
- Rehabilitation of 10 bridges throughout the County, including the railroad bridge on Billingsport Road in Paulsboro and bridges on Salina Road in Deptford/Washington Township, US 322 in Harrison Township, Clems Run Road in Harrison (two bridges), East Holly Avenue in Washington Township, Woodbury-Turnersville Road in Washington Township, Malaga Park Drive in Franklin, Floodgate Road in Logan and Gibbstown, and Jackson Road in Mantua

Future engineering projects on the horizon include:

- Installation of a roundabout at the intersection of CR 712 College Drive and Alumni Drive at Rowan College of South Jersey in Deptford
- Resurfacing and safety improvements to CR 604 Monroeville Road between Buck Road and the Salem County line as well as CR 611 Dutch Row Road between Buck Road and the Salem County line in the Townships of Franklin and Elk

- Resurfacing and safety improvements to US 322/CR 536 Mullica Hill Road/Swedeseboro Road between the Woolwich Township line and SR 55 in Harrison Township
- Resurfacing and safety improvements to Hurffville-Cross Keys Road CR 654 from Bells Lake Road to CR 651 Greentree Road in Washington Township
- Resurfacing and safety improvements to CR 640/534 Delaware/Cooper Street from Bergen to Union and SR 45 to Kelly Drive/NJ Turnpike Overpass
- Resurfacing and safety improvements to CR 668 Harrisonville Road in the Townships of Woolwich and South Harrison
- Rehabilitation of three bridges including two on CR 653 Swedeseboro Road in Gibbstown and one on CR 678 Mantua Road in East Greenwich
- Resurfacing and safety improvements to CR 536 SPUR Sicklerville Road from Camden County Line to US 42 in the Township of Monroe

FREE NALOXONE TRAINING

Commissioner Jim Jefferson, liaison to the Department of Health and Human Services, reminds residents that FREE naloxone kits and training are offered in collaboration with Rowan-Virtua School of Osteopathic Medicine and the Living Proof Recovery Center at Rowan College of South Jersey. Naloxone reverses an overdose caused by opioids such as heroin and fentanyl. This easy to use nasal spray can stop an opioid overdose and save a life.



Commissioner Jim Jefferson was joined by Hebba Ahmad and Bhaumik Patel at a recent naloxone training session at the Living Proof Recovery Center of RCSJ.

Training sessions will be held on **Monday, June 26** and **Monday, July 31** from 6:00pm to 7:00pm at Rowan College of South Jersey, Gloucester County Campus, 1492 Tanyard Road in Sewell. Kits will be distributed to all training attendees, including family members, friends, professionals, and individuals who are at risk or could potentially be in the presence of someone at risk of overdose. The Overdose Prevention Act eliminates all civil and criminal liability to anyone who administers naloxone.

NUTRITION PROGRAM MEAL SITES FOR SENIORS

Gloucester County residents sixty years and older are invited to participate in the Nutrition Program for an enjoyable midday meal from Monday to Friday at any of the six nutrition sites located throughout the county.

Menus are curated by a nutritionist to include the recommended daily nutrients. In addition to the meal, the sites provide recreational activities, foster social interaction, and offer assistance and information about other supportive services for seniors. A voluntary donation of \$1.25 is accepted for each meal, but it is not mandatory. All contributions received are treated with confidentiality and privacy and will be used to expand services and supplement Older Americans Act funds.

CAREGIVER SUPPORT PROGRAM AVAILABLE

Gloucester County offers the Caregiver Support Program to provide assistance and support to caregivers. This program aims to help caregivers access services that cater to their specific needs. Various services are available, including supplemental support to alleviate caregiver stress, guidance on addressing cognitive impairments and providing information about cognitive issues, assistance and support for grandparents raising grandchildren, and individual counseling. The program also offers assistance in navigating available in-home support.

Additionally, the Division of Senior Services organizes the “Circle of Caring” support group and the Grandparent Caregiver support group, both held at their offices in West Deptford.
