

Join Our Team! In the event of a public health emergency, volunteers are our most valuable resource.


The mission of the Gloucester County Medical Reserve Corp (GCMRC) is to improve the health and safety of communities by organizing and utilizing public health, medical, and other volunteers. The overarching goal of the GCMRC is to enhance the community's emergency preparedness by ensuring that a trained group of healthcare professionals and community volunteers are ready to respond to public health emergencies. Anyone with an interest in health issues can volunteer. We need licensed or certified healthcare professionals, practicing or retired, living or working in Gloucester County, but we also need community volunteers such as interpreters, chaplains, social workers, and support staff.

SUCH DUTIES MIGHT INCLUDE:

- Direct patient care
- Administrative or secretarial duties
- Translation or reception duties
- Assisting in community events, donation drives, and more!

Volunteers need to be aware that they will be required to participate in training and education in order to be adequately prepared should an event occur. Volunteers are asked to perform duties in accordance with their interests, training, and experience. Whether it is a medical emergency, natural disaster, terrorist incident, or even a routine immunization clinic, we provide FREE TRAINING to our volunteers to ensure support for our local health agencies when called upon.

PROTECT YOUR HOME



The Gloucester County Fire Marshal's Office, under the oversight of liaison Denice DiCarlo, would like to remind residents the importance of having working smoke detectors throughout the home. Please see the following statistics and safety tips from the New Jersey Division of Fire Safety. (Source: NFPA Research)

SAFETY TIPS

- Install smoke alarms in every sleeping room and outside each separate sleeping area. Install alarms on every level of the home. Install alarms in the basement.
- It is best to use interconnected smoke alarms so that when one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound.
- Test all smoke alarms at least once a month. Press the test button to be sure the alarm is working.
- A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.
- Working smoke alarms are an important part of a home fire escape plan.

The Gloucester County Fire Academy has recently undergone an improvement project funded with a \$3.5 million grant received by the State of New Jersey. With the support of The Gloucester County Commissioners and Rowan College of South Jersey our Fire Academy Staff is extremely excited with implementing the new upgrades to better serve the Fire Service. The new upgrades include a new apparatus and instructional building addition.

NEW 140'X 60' BUILDING WILL INCLUDE:

- Two new classrooms with new training tables and audio/visual equipment.
- New restroom facilities to include shower area.
- Large apparatus room to accommodate training apparatus along with providing an indoor training area.
- New office area for academy administrative staff and instructors.

NEW LIVE-FIRE TRAINING PROPS

The New Car Fire Simulator will provide advanced live fire training. The fires are fueled using environmentally friendly propane (LPG). The system is fully integrated with independently controlled burners to provide optimal control of each individual fire scenario.

The new 4-story Live-Fire Training Building has a modularized approach that contains (5) burn chambers, interior and exterior stairwells on all levels to enhance firefighter training scenarios. The new facility provides firefighters with several new training initiatives that we previously had to perform off-site resulting in reduced training time. In addition to live-fire training, this training prop has additional training capabilities for search and rescue, ladder placement, roof ventilation and confined space rescue.



STATE OF THE ART LIFESAVING EQUIPMENT

On February 21, 2025, Gloucester County Director Frank DiMarco, Deputy Director Jim Jefferson, and Commissioner Denice DiCarlo reviewed lifesaving equipment on GCEMS ambulances. Each vehicle is equipped with a LUCAS CPR device for continuous chest compressions, a hydraulic stretcher system to enhance patient and crew safety, and a Mobile Data Terminal (MDT) for real-time communication with dispatch. The MDT provides instant updates and tracks crew locations to ensure the nearest team responds to emergencies.



FOOD SAFETY TECHNIQUES



Gloucester County has over sixteen hundred retail food establishments which include restaurants, schools, supermarkets, hospitals, and nursing homes. As the number of Americans with food allergies is increasing, it is imperative to ensure that food service managers have a thorough understanding of ways to protect consumers. It is vital that as a customer you convey your allergies to your server.

There are three basic steps toward preventing allergic reactions in the food service industry:

- The server is to take the customer's requests seriously. Listen to customers and communicate information to the chef.
- The chef and waitstaff are to prevent cross contamination. Start fresh with clean hands, gloves, pans and utensils.
- Ask again when served if the requested meal was not prepared with the allergen.

Food allergies have the potential to be life threatening. Retail food establishments are encouraged to ensure that appropriate and effective methods of prevention are in effect. APRIL IS HEARTWORM AWARENESS MONTH

April is Heartworm Awareness Month, a reminder from the American Heartworm Society and Gloucester County Animal Shelter to keep pets on heartworm prevention.

Heartworm disease, spread by infected mosquitoes, affects the heart and lungs and can be fatal if untreated. Fortunately, it's easily prevented with annual vet visits and monthly prevention.

The Gloucester County Animal Shelter includes heartworm testing in all adoptions. Visit us Monday–Saturday to adopt:

GOVERNMENT GLOSSARY

Fiscal Audit

Governments conduct periodic fiscal audits. These are reviews administered by independent professional agencies to ensure taxpayer funding is being spent appropriately in support of community services and programs. Audits are performed to ensure that public funds are used lawfully and responsibly. They also help to ensure that government programs are achieving their goals. Auditors have the responsibility of inspecting financial records and other government documents to ensure regulatory and legal compliance.
